

Employment in West Sussex

Introduction

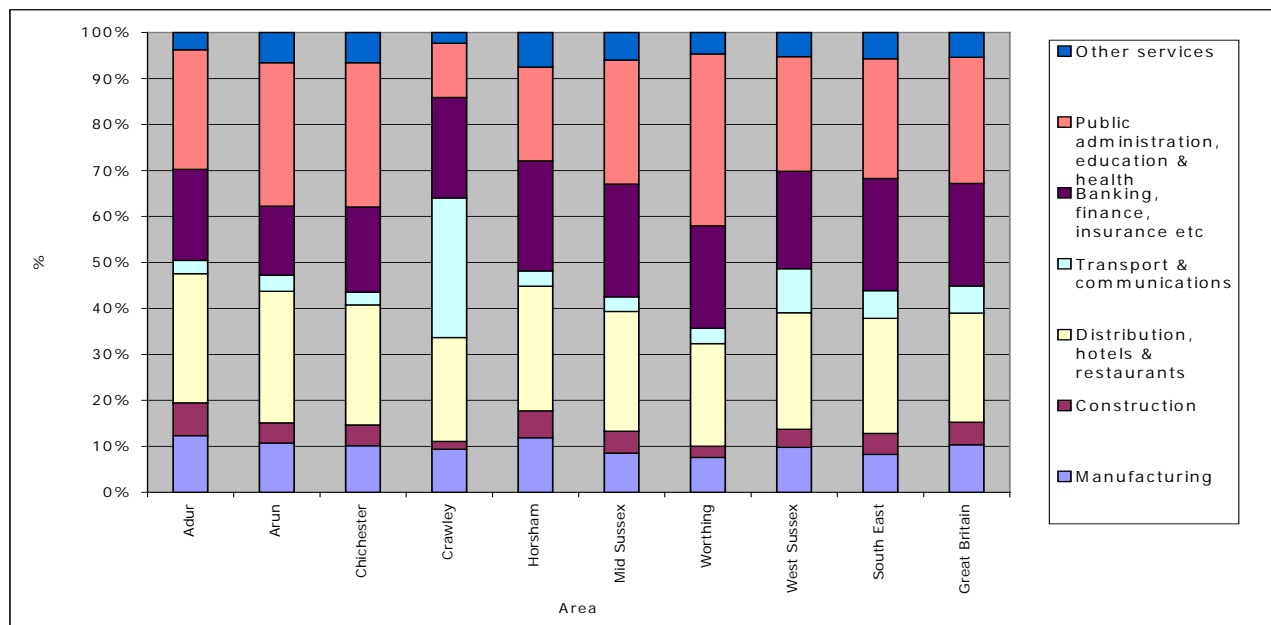
This report considers the data from the Annual Business Inquiry¹ and looks at trends over recent years. The 2008 ABI provides the latest detailed employment count, that is the number of employees in employment, for local areas down to ward level. Breakdowns are available by male/female, full/part time and industrial sector.

Employment by broad industrial sector

Chart 1 below shows the proportions of employees in employment by broad industrial sector.²

- The service sectors predominate, particularly distribution, hotels & restaurants and banking, finance & insurance. There is a high proportion of employees employed in the transport and communications sector in Crawley due to the presence of Gatwick Airport.
- Adur, Arun and Horsham have a higher proportion of employees in manufacturing jobs than the county average or regionally and nationally.
- Worthing has a higher proportion of jobs in the public administration, education and health sector due to the location of NHS West Sussex in Worthing.

¹ The Annual Business Inquiry (ABI) is a business survey undertaken nationally. It collects data from a sample of businesses in order to generate estimates of employee jobs by industry and geography, as well as conducting a breakdown of businesses by size.

² Agriculture and fishing has not been included in the tables in this part of the report. The ABI covers the non farm parts of the agricultural sector, much of the employment in this sector, along with construction sector is made up by self-employment which is not included in the ABI. Information from the Agricultural Census has been included at the end of this report.

- Between 2007 and 2008, manufacturing has shown a fall in West Sussex that has been larger than at the regional and national level. The largest fall has been in Adur with -15%. There has, however, been a small increase in Arun and Horsham.
- The only sector in West Sussex as a whole showing a rise in employees is public administration, education and health but there have been falls in this sector in Adur and Chichester.
- The construction and transport & communications sectors have also shown larger falls than at the regional and national level between 2007 and 2008.
- Between 2006 and 2008, banking, finance and insurance etc and public administration, education and health have shown falls in West Sussex whereas there have been rises in these sectors in both the South East and Great Britain.

Due to changes in the survey methodologies³, it is not possible to compare 2008 data with the years before 2006. However, consideration of the 1998-2005 data can give indications of trends over the longer term.

Table 3 below compares changes over the seven years from 1998-2005 by broad industrial sectors amongst the districts in West Sussex together with figures for the South East and Great Britain.

- Employment growth in West Sussex has been much lower than in the South East and Great Britain.
- From 1998-2005, manufacturing had shown a fall in the number of employees throughout West Sussex. However, the fall has been smaller than both nationally and regionally. The only district to show a rise was Horsham.

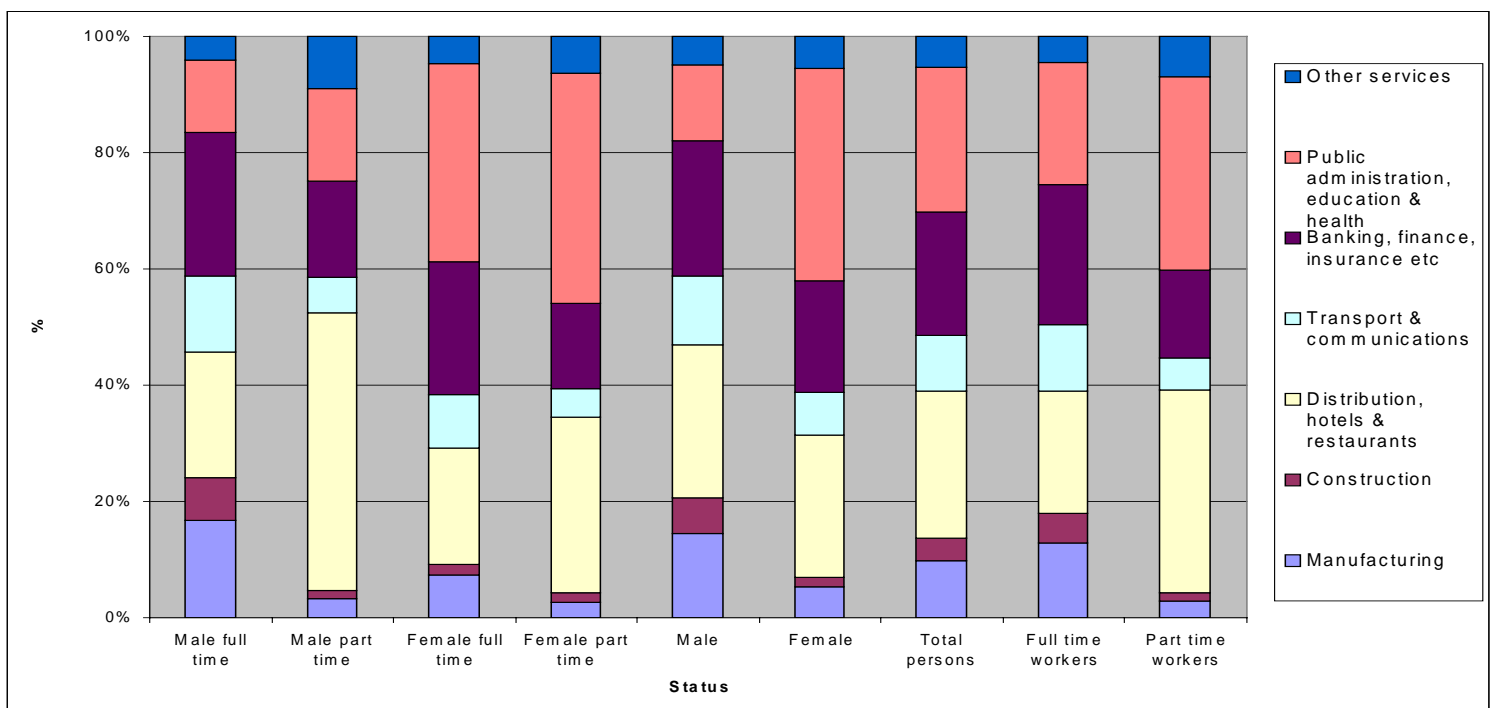
³ The ABI was introduced in 1998 and replaced the former Annual Employment Survey (AES). Because of inconsistencies in data collection and interpretation between the two comparison of trends over time is difficult. However, in considering changes in employees over time, it would appear during the period 1998-2005 annual average employment change was higher than it had been during the period 1991-1998. Most recently, there are further discontinuities which affect comparisons from 2006 with earlier years. Data suggests that all districts in West Sussex except Horsham and Mid Sussex have seen a slight fall in the number of employees. It must be stressed however, that the figures from the 2008 ABI are, to date, the preliminary figures and may be subject to review at the end of 2010.

Employees

According to the 2008 ABI there are around 333,000 employee jobs in West Sussex, of which 50.3% are held by females. This proportion is higher than regionally and nationally. There are around twice as many full time employee jobs than part time and of the part time jobs slightly less than three quarters are held by women. There has been a small fall (2,500) in employee jobs since 2007 which is to be expected in light of the economic downturn experienced in the second half of 2008 and this is expected to continue throughout 2009.

- The highest proportion of female employees are employed in the public administration, education and health sector, and the highest proportion of males is in the distribution, hotels and restaurants sector which accounts for about a quarter of all employee jobs in the county.
- The distribution, hotels and restaurant sector, and public administration, health and education sectors account for the greatest proportion of part time employee jobs.
- The Coastal districts of Arun, Chichester and Worthing see a higher proportion of part time and female workers than the rest of the County. The highest proportion is in Worthing where part time employees make up more than a third of all employees compared with Crawley at only 25%. Female employees in Worthing make up more than 57% of workers.
- Between 2007 and 2008 all districts except Adur have shown a rise in the number of part time workers. However, when comparing between 2006 and 2008 there have been small falls in part time workers in Horsham and Mid Sussex. The highest rise has been in Crawley where numbers have risen in excess of 7%, although it should be noted that part time employment is still much lower here than for the rest of the County.

- There is a higher proportion of full time jobs in Crawley at 74.5%. This is considerably higher than both nationally and regionally.
- Mid Sussex district is the only district within West Sussex to show a fall in full time employment between 1998 and 2005 but this trend appears to be have reversed most recently. Between 2007 and 2008, Horsham has also shown a small rise in the number of full time workers.

Further tables relating to employee numbers and changes over time are shown in Appendix 1 at the end of this report.

Businesses in West Sussex

- West Sussex is a small firm economy⁴, with around 86% of firms employing up to 10 employees. This follows the regional trend. There are more larger firms of over 100 employees in the Gatwick Diamond West Sussex Districts (Crawley, Horsham and Mid Sussex) than there are in the coastal districts. There is a greater proportion of large firms in the distribution, hotels and restaurants, the banking, finance, and business services, and public administration, education & health sectors.
- Whilst only 1.3% of firms in West Sussex employ over 100 employees, around 37% of all employees in West Sussex are employed in such sized firms. This proportion is highest in Crawley where around 58% of all employees are employed in larger firms of over 100 employees.

- Between 2006 and 2008 there has been a gradual increase in numbers employed by businesses employing 10 people or less. This has been particularly significant in the construction sector where there has been a subsequent fall in numbers employed by the very largest firms employing more than 200 people.
- Worthing is the only district in West Sussex to show an increase in the number of people employed by firms employing over 200 people, although the increase is smaller than both regionally and nationally.

Agricultural employment in West Sussex

The agricultural and horticultural sectors are not included in the ABI. The Agricultural Census, which is carried out on behalf of the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (Defra) in June each year has been used to compare changes in agricultural and horticultural employment.

- The number of persons employed in the agricultural and horticultural sectors has declined since 2001, nationally, regionally and within West Sussex. The fall in West Sussex has been lower than nationally but greater than for the South East.
- The largest rise between 2001 and 2008 has been seen in the part-time managers category although the rise in West Sussex have been smaller than regionally and nationally.
- Between 2007 and 2008 there has been a rise in the number of full-time farmers and the rise in West Sussex has been greater than for England as a whole. Nationally and regionally there has been a rise in the total number of workers employed and in the South East the numbers are now higher than they were in 2001.
- Between 2007 and 2008 West Sussex has seen a larger rise than regionally and nationally in the numbers of male part time employees. It should be noted however, that for this survey, part time working is classed as working 39 hours or less per week.
