#### Source 1

In the 19th and early 20th centuries, children enjoyed rides in carts pulled by goats on the promenade at Worthing.

# TEACHERS' NOTES

#### Source 2

From the early 19th century until well into the 1960s and 1970s, children could take donkey rides on the beach in most seaside resorts.

### Source 3

As well as donkey rides, this postcard features some of the timeless beach activities: making sandcastles with flags, sitting in deck-chairs or on the sand, strolling on the beach or on the prom....

Clothes worn on the beach in the 1920s tended to be more formal than today - note the boy's jacket, shoes and socks, and the hats and shoes being worn by the women.

## Sources 4 and 11

Sports equipment such as water chutes and trampolines was often provided as an added attraction in seaside resorts.

# Sources 5, 6, 9, 12 and 13

Building sandcastles has been a favourite seaside pastime for children through the ages.

- 5: In 1929, the two-year-old Princess Elizabeth (later Queen Elizabeth II) was visiting her grandfather King George V who was recuperating from a serious illness in Bognor. Here she is making sandcastles near Craigwell House, where the King was staying.
- 6, 9, 12: These photographs show children making sandcastles in the 1920s, 1930s, 1950s and 1970s.

#### Source 7

Playing cricket and other sports was a popular beach activity in 1947 as it is today.

#### Source 8

This photograph of children enjoying "motor racing" on the beach appeared in the 1950 Bognor Regis guide-book.

#### Source 10

Punch and Judy shows were a regular feature of most seaside resorts into the 1960s, but are less common now.

#### Source 14

Source 14 is a description of a young girl and her brother and sister on the beach during their seaside holiday in Worthing in 1911. This was written in 1979-80 by Florence Alice Holloway (1901-1994).
