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## TEACHERS' NOTES

#### Source 1

Boys play marbles in a village street. Note the rough quality of their clothes and boots, which indicates they come from working class families.

#### Source 2

Print showing a girl playing with a hoop on the seafront near Worthing pier. Hoops were an inexpensive or home-made toy which could be enjoyed by children of all classes.

#### Source 3

This doll's house has quite elaborate furniture and other household objects, as well as dolls. It was a relatively expensive toy affordable only by the better-off.

#### Source 4

Model soldiers and forts were popular toys for boys.

#### Sources 5 and 6

These are mechanical toys, made of metal. They would be wound up using the key at the back and would then move along the floor or table.

#### Source 7

This is a good-quality doll with elaborate facial features, clothes, hat and hair.

#### Source 8

Board games were a popular indoor pastime for groups of children to play together, sometimes with adults.

## Source 9

Rocking horses were popular toys for nursery-age children. They varied from simple designs with wooden rockers to technically more sophisticated - and more expensive - models such as this one. Worthing Museum and Art Gallery has a photograph of a young boy on this horse.

### Source 10

This girl is posing for a photograph with some toys: she is holding a shuttlecock and a bat, there is a hoop leaning against the chair, and a musical birdcage and a book are on the chair. The posed portrait and the range of toys, as well as her dress, would indicate that she comes from a relatively well-off family.
